

The ride to that Club meeting was with Farmer, Moe and Jocko Gagnon, Jim-O, Bill Hamilton and Pete Thompson. That was an eye-opening ride! I was intrigued by the Club history and impressed by its plans for upcoming events so before the meeting was over, I realized that I wanted to become a member. Farmer sponsored me for membership and I will always be grateful to him for that.


My first motorcycle was a 1970 250cc BSA Starfire single cylinder with an upswept exhaust pipe. There was a guard on the exhaust pipe so that passenger would not burn their leg. The bolts holding the guard would shake loose and the guard would fall off. When I lost the bolts on the way to Sauble Beach, I got bolts at a Massey Ferguson dealership in Owen Sound, which were a different pitch or maybe slightly larger and needed more force to install them. Bolts never shook loose again while I owned the bike.

I think back on that trip to Sauble Beach, my first long trip on a motorcycle. Four of us going to meet four college girls at one's family cottage for a May 24 weekend. My British bike, two 250cc Yamahas and a 350cc Honda. Running shoes, change of clothes, light jacket, no rain gear; we were such rookies! Got caught in a huge rainstorm on the way home. Hours and hours in a steady rain, soaked to the skin, trying to find shelter behind trailers to cut the wind. Lesson learned? Some of the Club members who know me are likely to say no.

My second motorcycle was a 1981 CB750F Honda Supersport, a huge jump from the BSA. Certainly, better for long trips and I took many of them after my separation. Lots of family in Quebec and I went there often and over much of Ontario except for the north and northwest. It was the bike I owned when I joined the Club, so it went on all the fishing trips to Dorset, Ontario, Pennsylvania and Ohio: as well as Bike Week in Daytona and a number of times to West Virginia. In 1989 fellow Club member Jeff Hall and I rode to the Maritimes and back through Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire and New York to home. I really liked that bike and have great memories of it. It was written off in 1994 when a drunk smashed into the back of me coming out of the Townline Tunnel after a Club meeting.





My next ride was a 1984 XJ 1100 Yamaha Maxim, which I purchased in November of 1994 to replace the CB750F. That bike came off the road in 2017 and was the centerpiece of the 2018 bike blow-up and burn-out at the Club. Entertaining to its very end. The burnt-out remains are in a place of honor along the laneway to the campground in the pits.




